It was another busy year for Kaa Pack and the cubs were busy working on their World, Navigator, Naturalist, Pioneer and Environmental Conservation badges. In addition the cubs spent time trying their hands at orienteering, paracord crafts, shelter building and Airfix modelling.

Outside of the Scout Hut, the cubs made the most of the local geography with hikes up Barmekin and Kirkhill, cycling in Dunecht estate, fishing at Lochter, sailing on Loch Skene and a paddle boarding session at Granite Adventures.

Shere Khan Cubs

2024/2025 has been a great year for Shere Khan, we awarded **390** badges: 5 Chief Scout Silver Awards, 36 Chief Scout Challenge Awards and 349 Activity & Staged badges.

Over the 4 terms we have invested 21 new cubs and have maintained a consistent volunteer team with 2 team leads, 3 team members and 1 young leader. We ended the year with 27 cubs, and we aim keep our numbers at 27 for the next couple of terms to ensure we have spaces for the Beavers who will swim up later this year. We are forecasting being back to 36 by March 2026.

Major activities (in addition to our normal programming for the year) were, a night hike up Tappie Tower, a pack visit to the Fire Station, 10 pin bowling, a cyclists badge camp at Lochter Activity Centre, a visit to the Gang Show and our Family Camp at Templars Park





Our camp at Lochter was a huge success, the cubs had a great time and all who attended managed to gain the cyclists badge by the end of the weekend along with nights away badges. The cubs had fun cycling round the go-kart track and I don't know where they got the energy!

A huge thanks to our parent volunteers who have helped us run these diverse activities. Without your assistance we wouldn't be able to plan some many fun activities and it's great for the cubs to see parents getting involved and having fun! Some have volunteered so frequently we think they want to become a team member, fingers crossed. To all our parents, think about your family background and personal skills.





We had a fantastic couple of evenings this year thanks to a parent who helped us by talking about Up Helly Aa and bringing along costumes for our cubs to try on. A truly memorable evening for the cubs culminating in the burning of cardboard longships they had made. Memories that they will have for life and only a couple of hours of effort from a parent!



Westwood Scouts

The 2024-25 year for Westwood Troop saw a transition of leadership as we welcomed Niall and Stewart while seeing Garry step up to Explorers. It has also seen the Troop grow to 24 members, moving from two to four patrols. This gives a wider range of opportunities for our older Scouts to step up and take on Patrol Leader and Assistant Patrol Leader positions.





We continue to have a dynamic and adventurous program woven in with building traditional scouting skills and resilience within our young people.

We also organised our first Expedition in over 2 years, taking 13 Scouts to Jock Neish Scout Centre down in Tayside alongside the Keir Troop, packing them off in independent groups of 4-5 Scouts to complete routes they had previously helped plan in our preparatory weeks.

Many of the Troop were represented at our Wild West-themed family camp back in May and we look forward to doing many more camps going forward.



And while the traditional Scouting skills are great, we also found plenty of



time for some fun challenges like toilet-paper mummies at Halloween, cycling, fishing, climbing, and completing Taskmaster challenges!

Collectively, the Troop earned a total of 158 badges over this period, including 2 Chief Scouts Gold awards which is the highest available in Scouts.



Keir Scouts

Our summer 2024 program involved preparation for the adventure camp at Craufurdland Castle, Kilmarnock. We practiced cooking meals on trangias, tent pitching and brushed up on our first aid skills. We had 10 scouts joining this camp and they had a blast! Other activities included navigation skills and working on the You Shape badge.

After the summer we kicked off the program with paint balling and completing the dragon boating badge on 'dry land'. The scouts built really good dragon boats and their teamwork was excellent.





We finished the year in preparing for our Christmas market and invited families and friends to join us for our last evening of the year. Two scouts - Henry and Oscar - achieved their Chief Scout's Gold award and we were delighted to present them their well-deserved award.

2025 started off with attending a Warhammer event, celebrating Burns night, we prepared for our Exploration camp to Jock Neish and had a fantastic (nearly dry) weekend with the Westwood Scouts exploring the area around Abroath. We finished the term with exploring space and building some excellent space constellations and designing a rover.

sections. This sees the Explorers develop their leadership skills and is often a welcome help for our adult volunteers.

Explorers have also enjoyed fun activities and meeting other explorers from across Scotland at the Woolly Jumper Explorer camp at Templars, Cally Rally camp near Inverness and also the

satellite weekend camp/ full Blair Atholl international jamborette.
